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Reflections

In her *New Forward* to Marjorie J. Thompson's, *Soul Feast: An Invitation to the Christian Spiritual Life*, Barbara Brown Taylor encourages this book to be "... not only on [our shelves], but in [our lives]... it [gives the reader] the tools to *engage* the spiritual life—both for your health and the health of the world" (pp. ix, x).

Henri J. M. Nouwen, in the original *Forward* to the book reminds us that "Spiritual disciplines are nothing more and nothing less than ways to create a room where Christ can invite us to feast with him at the table of abundance." Nouwen is convinced "that for those who take this book seriously and apply it to their individual as well as communal lives, a true transformation will take place—a transformation that will affect not only [our] interior [lives] but also the life of the Body of Christ, the Church" (p. xiv).

Marjorie Thompson reminds us that we are in a post-modern world and that we live in a time where the Spirit is breaking through. This is a time of emerging Christianity which is "... profoundly Spirit-centered, seeking discernment through deep listening ..." (p. xix).

As we move through the first four chapters of Thompson's book during the upcoming weeks of the Lenten season, we will be introduced in chapter 1 to the "basic terms and perspectives concerning the Christian spiritual life," in chapter 2, "consider the practice of spiritual reading understood as the meditative reading of scripture," in chapter 3, we will look at the Christian practice of prayer, and in chapter 4, examine "the role of public worship in our spiritual formation" (p. xxv).

Just as a flowing river slowly changes the landscape of a river bed, so deciding to explore spiritual disciplines can change our spiritual lives. The river carves its bed over time with the current of the natural water flow. The Spirit's current within us is always carving a new shape to the faith within us over time. Sometimes, a force of nature will cause a river to change course and sometimes, when we are introduced to a different way of considering things, a natural force within us, the Spirit, causes us to make a change. When this happens, we hear God from a new inner place and we develop a deeper understanding of God. The Spirit has a mystical power that touches and changes lives. Perhaps this is what you are seeking.

We are about to embark on an individual and communal journey that will hopefully open the door to a glimpse of a deeper relationship with God. It is a journey that each of us takes alone, yet not alone. Our inward relationship with God is private, yet it is outwardly shared with our brothers and sisters in Christ. Together we ask questions and discuss our thoughts so that we can better understand how God interacts with one another.

Be faithful in reading, meditating on scripture, praying, and in worship as we journey together through the Christian Spiritual Life. May God grant each of us grace and love and peace in the days and weeks ahead.

In the wilderness you strive. In Canaan you trust. In the wilderness you seek God's attention. In Canaan you already have God's favor. In the wilderness you doubt God's salvation. In Canaan you know you are already saved. You move from wanting-to-have to believing you already do." Learning to recognize the gifts God has given is one step in moving to *Promised Land* living.

Who Me, An Elder?

Information for this article came from Your Calling as an Elder by Gary Straub, pp. 13-14. Here is Straub's continued brief interpretive summary of the biblical qualifications for elder leadership: 9. "Grave." (KJV) Titus 2:2

An Elder takes pain, distress, and need seriously; gives attention to serious matters.

10. Able to Teach. Titus 1:9

An elder teaches and preaches the gospel. "A teachable and teaching spirit is the elder's spiritual legacy to the congregation."

11. Blameless. Titus 1:6

Not to be construed with perfectionism or faultlessness. An Elder lives by God's grace "above reproach, accusation, or complaint that might be leveled, whether legitimate or just those 'sour grape' aspersions that often make the best whine!"

Who Me, A Deacon?


Information for this article came from *Your Calling as a Deacon* by Gary Straub and James Trader II, pp.35-37. Straub and Trader continue a discussion about "*Discerning Our Gifts as Deacons*." (part 2)

As the Spirit works within us, we become sensitized to discern what is of the spirit and what is of the flesh. Our spiritual character begins to develop, we begin to see the fruit of the Spirit manifested through our ". . . character, compassion, quiet strength, and courage in danger. All these graces become ours as we open ourselves up and welcome the Holy Spirit to commune with our spirit in the depths of our being."

"Spiritual gifts are unmerited blessings from God." They are "special powers or abilities given by God to build up the body of Christ. Gifts are essentially job descriptions for ministries . . . The presence of Christ is known through the exercise of our gifts." Discovering our spiritual gifts gives us purpose in life and the fulfillment in the rightful use of the gifts.

Acts 2:38 – "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." This is the scripture that tells us that the Holy Spirit, who has been abiding in us since birth, is unleashed in us upon our baptism. It is because of our baptism that we can begin to understand the spiritual gifts God has given to us and for us to use them as we grow spiritually. "... It is critical to our discipleship as deacons that we discover and use our spiritual gifts (1 Cor. 12:1). Fulfillment comes in the right use of our gifts (Rom. 12:1-2; Jn. 15:8, 10-11; Eph. 4:11-15).

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SOUL FEAST




You are invited to join us for a Soup Supper each Thursday evening from February 22 to March 22

SPOTLIGHT ON DISCIPLES

The Beginning of Organization (part 2)

Statewide organization began to appear as early as 1834. The Disciples in Pennsylvania organized with signs of several congregations in Springfield, Illinois coming together. June 1839 marks the announcement in *The Millennial Harbinger* for the first statewide meeting, held in Indianapolis, June 7-11. It was well attended with 139 congregations and 8,000 members reported as present. Barton W. Stone preached. "Resolutions on education, on cooperation, and on supporting evangelists were made and discussed." The next meeting was set for June, 1840. Alexander Campbell wrote in *The Millennial Harbinger*:

An annual meeting in some central point in each state in the union, conducted on similar principles, exhibiting the statistics of the churches united in the primitive faith and manners, would in many ways greatly promote the prosperity of the cause. Co-operation and combination of effort is the great secret of success. Other states soon followed suit.
