Reflections

As we are moving past Christmas and Epiphany in the church calendar, the season of Lent is upon us. I recently ran across an article entitled, *The Origins of Lent*, by my colleague, Louise Sloan-Goben at First Christian Church, North Hollywood, California. I hope you find it helpful as we prepare ourselves to observe this meditational season.

Lent! The name probably comes from an old Anglo-Saxon word meaning "lengthen," referring to the fact that days get longer in spring. It is interesting to note that neither Lent nor Easter have their origins in Christianity, but in the religions of people that existed before the Christian faith was brought into Europe by the first missionaries. But the church has always been willing to adopt native customs and re-signify their meanings and put them to work for Christ.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and extends for 40 days until Easter. The 40 days represent the 40 days that Jesus fasted in the wilderness during his temptation (*Matthew 4:1-11*). Easter is one Christian holiday that moves around the calendar from year to year, corresponding to the spring calendar and full moons, and usually falling sometime around the celebration of the Jewish Passover.

Where did we get this custom of celebrating Lent? Jesus did not command it. The disciples never observed any such custom as 40 days set aside for prayer and repentance before Easter. There is no mention of Lent in the Bible. Lent owes its origin to two different customs that grew up in the Christian Church.

Very early in the life of the church, believers recognized that the most important steps in Jesus' life occurred that last week which led to the resurrection of Jesus. The early Christians fasted from 6:00 p.m. Saturday evening until 3:00 a.m. Easter morning. Then they celebrated the Lord's Supper together and rejoiced in the good news of the resurrection.

Soon the fast was extended to 40 hours to represent the time that Jesus was in the grave and eventually expanded to include all of Holy Week (Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday). In addition to fasting, Christians in Jerusalem also began to re-create the steps Jesus and his accusers took on Good Friday, leading to Jesus' crucifixion and pilgrims came to the city and walked the way of sorrows to the cross, the Via Dolorosa. Some of these customs, begun before 400 A.D. are still observed in Jerusalem today.

The second source also centered on the Saturday night/Sunday morning vigil for it became the practice of the church to baptize new Christians early on Easter morning. In the New Testament times it apparently was the practice to baptize people immediately upon their coming to faith. Later when the church was under persecution, it became customary for new Christians to undergo a lengthy period of instruction before an individual was permitted to learn the secret creed of the church and be considered worthy of membership. This was simply a matter of survival. So the time before Easter became a period of study, meditation and fasting for candidates for baptism.

The two sources of Lent remain part of our Lenten observance to this day; one places emphasis on Jesus' activity, and the other stresses our own preparation for Easter. Lent bids us look up to the one who is our Lord, but also invites us to look into our hearts and lives to make sure Christ dwells there too.

In Canaan you know you are already saved. You move from wanting-to-have to believing you already do." Learning to recognize the gifts God has given is one step in moving to *Promised Land* living.



Who Me, An Elder?

Information for this article came from Your Calling as an Elder by Gary Straub, p.12-13. Here is Straub's continued brief interpretive summary of the biblical qualifications for elder leadership:

7. Holder of the Word. Titus 1:9

Another elder quality is to be able to "[surrender] one's own desires and outcomes to the truth of God revealed." An elder embraces God's word in his or her soul and embraces it and keeps it as a fit vessel or an ark (Thessalonians 4:4).

8. Orderly. 1 Timothy 3:2

An elder is able to monitor and honor the process of decision-making and to help give others structure amid chaos.

Acts 2:38 – "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." This is the scripture that tells us that the Holy Spirit, who has been abiding in us since birth, is unleashed in us upon our baptism. It is because of our baptism that we can begin to understand the spiritual gifts God has given to us and for us to use them as we grow spiritually. "... It is critical to our discipleship as deacons that we discover and use our spiritual gifts (1 Cor. 12:1). Fulfillment comes in the right use of our gifts (Rom. 12:1-2; Jn. 15:8, 10-11; Eph. 4:11-15).

Proceeds from this fundraiser help offset the cost of the Troops High Adventurer program and summer camp fees for the scouts.



The Beginning of Organization (part 1)

After dissolving the Mahoning Association in 1830, the movement began the sometimes uncooperative process of becoming an organization. The first task at hand was to bring this frontier society—the school teachers, farmers, lawyers, doctors, and business men-together in unity. "Following this expression of openmindedness they announced a sermon on Christian union at which time the evangelist would portray the evils of a divided church and human creeds. They would then propose a plan on which all reasonable people could unite: the restoration of New Testament teaching." Alexander Campbell gave much space in his Millennial Harbinger journal for the reports of evangelists' successes. As these successes were made known, Campbell began to advocate for cooperation and became a responsible and representative leader of the movement.
