Reflections

The people of Jesus' time certainly thought about their ancestors' liberation from Egypt, especially at the Passover Festival. Their plight was similar. The people were sorely oppressed by their government causing widespread distress and fear. It is in that climate that Jesus rode the donkey into Jerusalem on that first "Palm Sunday." The triumphant event was the rally cry of the people. Their King had come to save them although they did not know how it would come about.

As we enter Holy Week, we remember the "turning of the tables" at the Temple, the Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, the trial, the beatings and the crucifixion. "The Son of Man, "Jesus said, "must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him" (John 3:14-15). Jesus rode in protest of the Roman oppressors to save the people who were shouting, "Hosanna (Save us)!" He, in effect, replaced the wounds of the people with his own wounds.

Jesus took our powerlessness with him to his trial. He stood there before his judges as a passive victim. They just could not get any information from him. He engulfed our powerlessness into his being and changed everything. In the few hours of Jesus' trial, he showed that passiveness is strength. In his passiveness, he gave voice to those who have no voice. Christ, the Messiah, the lowly One on the donkey surpassed the greatness of the one on the warhorse (Pontius Pilate) sentencing him to the cross.

The disciples, Jesus' dearest friends, ran away that night. They were so frightened for their lives. Only a few remained—Mary, his mother, Mary, and John along with a few others. The sorrow was great, but so was the love. God cried a great thunderstorm and shook the earth. God tore the curtain of the Temple from top to bottom to tell the world that God no longer lived behind a curtain with limited access, but in the hearts of all people through Jesus Christ. Courage and confidence were restored.

Finally, on Easter Day, Jesus appeared to Mary Magdalene and to the disciples gathered in fear in a locked room. Their hope returned as they regrouped their courage and confidence. The One riding on the donkey really HAD come to save them and they would go out and tell the GOOD NEWS to the world!

Hope turned powerlessness into the power of love so great that through that love the world might live in peace. May our courage be strengthened, and our confidence emboldened that we, too, will spread the GOOD NEWS far and wide. HE IS ALIVE!

Toward a National Organization (part 3)

Although Disciples have never been numerous in the East and Northeast, there were some early starters. Park Avenue Christian Church planted its roots in the pre-Campbell era in 1810 and is New York's oldest Disciples congregation. Other eastern congregations in Maryland (1833), Philadelphia (soon after Maryland), and Connecticut (1840) affiliated with Disciples after visits by Alexander Campbell.

Campbell's message of Christian unity and the revival of the New Testament church was strongly heard by churches withdrawing from their Baptist affiliations in Virginia, Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina. Audiences of *The Christian Baptist* and *The Millennial Harbinger* were fertile ground for Campbell's vision. Nathan W. Smith was responsible for organizing many Disciples congregations in Georgi over his 60 years of preaching on unity.
