Graduation announcement cards are being readied. Caps and gowns sized and ordered. Final exams are fast approaching. Parties are being planned. Diplomas are being printed. Commencement speeches are being written with opening lines like "Even if you are on the right track, you will get run over if you just sit there" - Will Rogers.

Some fun commencement facts – the traditions of gowns goes all the way back to the 12th century because universities had no heating systems. The caps or mortarboard became popular in the 14th and 15th centuries by artists and students who wore them. The tossing of the cap was started by Naval Academy in 1912. The turning of the tassel is a young tradition of the last 40 to 50 years.

Students walk in to the tune of "Pomp and Circumstance." It was first known as "Land of Hope & Glory" when Sir Edward Elgar wrote it 1901. The phase "Pomp and Circumstance" came from Shakespeare's *Othello*. It was first played at a graduation in 1905 when Sir Elgar received an honorary doctorate from Yale University.

Who Me, An Elder?

Information for this article came from Your Calling as an Elder by Gary Straub, pp. 17-18. Here is Straub's continued brief interpretive summary of the biblical qualifications for elder leadership:

Six Negative Traits

When calling persons for eldership, matters of six negative traits need to be taken into careful consideration before the call is made. "The point is: Elders need to exhibit balanced spiritual maturity that allows them to contribute their unity to the bond of peace that holds at the core of the congregation." Every elder's wisdom needs to be part of the solution rather than contribute to the problem.

3. Not Soon To Anger (Quick-tempered) Titus 1:7

Anger is a human emotion. We all become angry at times. Even Jesus became angry. "Our anger will most likely work trouble unless it is grounded in scripture and holy boldness against oppression and other indignities consistent with the character of God." We need to ask, "Is [our anger] under God's control?" Anger can serve to contaminate the community with negative feelings and needs to be tethered. "Anger is like nitroglycerin: it can either heal a heart or blow up a bridge, and elders who haven't submitted their anger to the Spirit are lose canons!

Who Me, A Deacon?

Information for this article came from Your Calling as a Deacon by Gary Straub and James Trader II, p. 58-59.

One way to keep spiritually focused is to practice the basic spiritual disciplines.

6. Intercession

Work and prayer go together. "In many ways, deacons' prayer work down in the trenches of ministry follows the frontier practice of the Shakers, whose motto was 'hearts to God, hands to work." As deacons work in Christ's ministry, they will find "the rhythm of work and prayer repeats itself until these two distinct elements meld into one continual life of prayer."



SPOTLIGHT ON DISCIPLES

Disciples and Slavery

Information for this article came from Journey in Faith by Lester G. McAllister and William E. Tucker, pp. 189-200. The Disciples founders agreed wholeheartedly in their opposition to slavery. As the country began to divide on this subject, the founders "were determined to keep Disciples from splitting over pollical disagreements." They insisted that they were justified in the fact that the New Testament did not explicitly condemn slavery. They did not declare abolition as an answer to the problem, but remained neutral. Their agreement of "Where the scriptures speak, we speak. Where the scriptures are silent, we are silent," they argued that "one's position on slavery was a matter of 'opinion' rather than 'faith' and should not become a test of Christian fellowship." Even though they spoke out against slavery, they maintained relationship with other Disciples who were slaveholders. Disciples of the North and the South were as diverse on the subject as they were in their opinions about scripture. The built-in organizational pliability and commitment to individual interpretation and choice of the Disciples helped the young movement to remain intact through the conflict of the Civil War.
