Reflections

As we continue to look at Robert Schnase's Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations (2018). Chapter 3, "The Practice of Passionate Worship" (pp. 50-52). I hope you use his ideas to broaden your perspective. It's important to measure new ideas with our own as we continue to seek God's guidance along our journey of encountering God through our worship experiences.

Schnase explains that through worship, new life is breathed into the gathered community. "Worship forms communities, shapes souls, corrects self-interest, and binds people to God and to their neighbor." Through the common worship experience, "God pardons sins, restores relationships, and changes lives."

The act of worship was practiced from the earliest times. The Israelites worshipped in synagogues out in the wilderness. "Synagogue means 'to bring together,' and the Greek word for church, ekklesia, means 'called out of the world,' and refers to the calling of people from their ordinary life to gather together in sacred time and space . . . Worship defines God's people."

We are creatures of worship and meant to worship God. Exodus 8:1 gives the reason that God liberated the Hebrews from Egypt: "Let my people go, so that they may worship me." When we worship we become reconnected with God and God expects us to love God more every time we worship.

Schnase illustrates one pastor's objectives for worship. What do you think about these practices?

This pastor helps his people understand more about God, Jesus, the stories of scripture, the practice of the faith, and the world around them. Worship changes minds. The pastor also engages the heart, reaching the interior life of worshippers. The intimacy of worship helps people know mercy, grow in hope, sense the Holy Spirit, and offer and receive forgiveness. Worship opens hearts. Finally, the pastor seeks to engage people with a practical challenge to do something differently in their family, community, and world because of their faith in Christ.

Worship changes us. (Bold emphasis are mine).

What adds meaning to worship for you? What distracts you from finding deeper connection? This is a spiritual journey for all of us as we continue to ask questions, seeking for more meaningful ways to engage each other with God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit.

A Crusade for a Christian World

Post World War II brought a renewed feeling of expectation to Disciples. A new cooperative program was designed to encompass the total life of the church. A new excitement was in the air and caught the imaginations of those who attended the 1946 International Convention. Out of their new commitment to the "faith, life, and work of the church universal" came the idea for the largest program ever attempted by Disciples, "A Crusade for a Christian World."

From 1947-1950, emphasis was given to the creation of 200 new congregations, new members, recruitment for ministry and mission fields. A campaign to raise \$14,000,000 was begun. As the "Crusade" found its footing, Orman L. Shelton (dean of Butler University) wrote an important book, *The Church Functioning Effectively* (1946), which outlined seven functional committees within the church: membership development, worship and devotional life, Christian education, missionary outreach, finance and stewardship education, evangelism, and property. The Home and State Missions Planning Council later published manuals on each of the functional committees and their duties. Many Disciples congregations adopted the functional approach.

A Crusade for a Christian World, gave the denomination a lift. Renewed meaning and was breathed into the Christian life of Disciples and inspired them to move forward.
