Reflections

As we continue to look at Robert Schnase's *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* (2018). Chapter 3, "The Practice of Passionate Worship" (pp. 50-55), Schnase asks the question, "Why Passionate?"

Engaging in passionate worship keeps it from becoming dry, routine, boring, and predictable, and lacking in spirit. Schnase suggests that worship "should express our devotion, our honor and love of God." He frames the worship experience with the term passionate and gives definition to this type of worship.

Passionate is described as "an intense desire, an ardent spirit, strong feelings, and the sense of heightened importance . . . an emotional connection that goes beyond intellectual consent."

Therefore, Passionate Worship:

- •fosters a yearning to authentically honor God with excellence and with an unusual clarity about connecting people to God
- •is alive, authentic, fresh, and engaging
- leads people to be honest and open to God's presence, truth, and will
 so opens people's desire for such worship that they reorder their lives to belong
- •fills the empty places in people's souls
- •provides a compelling sense of belonging to the body of Christ

Schnase proposes that in spiritually alive communities, "there's a palpable air of expectancy as people gather, a vibrant curiosity about how God's presence will become known." This happens with prepared worship: musicians, readers, greeters, and other hosts arrive early—preparing and encouraging each other.

While the worship leaders prepare to lead, Schnase also mentions later in the chapter that <u>worshippers also have a responsibility to spiritually prepare for</u> <u>worship</u>. One way to do this is to read the scriptures listed in the newsletter for each week. "Nothing reinforces the practice of community worship better than a vibrant personal devotional life" (p. 69).

I'll leave you this week with Schnase's question: "What creates a sense of expectancy for you as you prepare for worship?"

We have much to consider as we continue to re-imagine and re-create our worship experience together. Please keep our diligent worship leaders in prayer.





- Pray for the teacher as she begins to do her planning; teachers have so much to pack in, and the unexpected will enter in.
- Pray for the teacher as she receives information about her students; she needs openness, insight, wisdom, and compassion.
- Pray for the teacher as she meets a whole new group of parents; parent relationships are crucial to the success of students & teachers.

Every teacher is a real person who goes to the grocery store, does laundry, has dinner with friends, cries, hurts, and worries. She needs the Kleenex and the hand sanitizer, but most of all, she needs your prayers.

Expanded Services

After World War II, the advisory work of the International Convention became more important. Disciples continually worked on the issue of identity and at the 1956 International Convention of Disciples of Christ, the name was changed to the International Convention of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ). The development of *Christian Worship: A Service Book* brought a standardized form of worship in hundreds of congregations. Two meeting grounds were purchased, one near Black Mountain, North Carolina and one near Portland, Oregon. New agencies and committees formed and reported to the International Convention such as a Long-Range Program for the 1950-60 decade, and the National Church Program Coordinating Council bringing a means to review all program plans for the first time. The Christian Woman's Board of Missions developed their interests more broadly. The functional committee approach led women to become more involved in all phases of the church's program and ultimately led the way to the creation of Christian Women's Fellowship (CWF). By 1952, CWF met as an international group and in 1957, the first CWF Quadrennial Assembly was held on the campus of Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana. The men also organized by 1948 and became Christian Men's Fellowship (CMF) in 1955. Christian Youth Fellowship (CYF) began in 1944. In 1969, new joint curriculum was developed for CWF/CMF programs, group studies, and retreat materials.
