Reflections

In our look at Robert Schnase's *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* (2018), it is time to move on to Chapter 4, "The Practice of Intentional Faith Development" (pp. 77-100). Here, Schnase offers instruction on faith formation.

In this segment (pp. 77-79) Schnase builds on his former chapters, "The Practice of Radical Hospitality" and "The Practice of Passionate Worship," insisting that faith formation is built in concert with these other areas. Christ invites us with Radical Hospitality and God transforms us through Passionate Worship. "Growing in Christ requires more than weekly worship though, and it is through Intentional Faith Development that God's Spirit works in us, perfecting us in the practice of love as we grow in the knowledge and love of God."

Schnase maintains that Christians mature in faith by learning together in community. By intentionally offering experiences in high-quality faith development, people are helped to understand scripture while building supportive, caring relationships with others in the faith community. Although it is very important to attend classes and Bible Studies, these experiences extend beyond the classroom in the form of "children's church, camps, retreats, support groups that apply faith to particular life challenges, dinner conversation gatherings and youth ministries," etc. Christians grow in faith and Christ-likeness through study and learning and "God is best able to form disciples when people do this together."

To learn in community is to follow Christ's example of teaching his disciples. Jesus' disciples listened to his stories, instructions, and lessons while gathered for meals, on hillsides, and in religious settings. He gathered people together, whoever they were and wherever they were from. They all met together as one.

After Pentecost, when the church formed, the Christians thrived as "they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42). They learned in community.

Christianity is something we grow into and strive toward. We put away our former way of life and put on a new way of life (Ephesians 4:22, 24). Christians seek to have the mind of Christ Jesus, "allowing God's Spirit to shape our thoughts, attitudes, values, and behaviors. Growing in Christ-likeness is the goal of the life of faith."

Together, God changes us through the work of the Spirit. We become new persons through God's grace (2 Corinthians 5:17). It takes a lifetime to "strain forward towards the goal" (Philippians 3:12-14). Growing in faith means that we are moving, growing, changing, and maturing throughout our lifetimes. As we mature, God cultivates in us the fruit of the Spirit: "love, joy, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). Christians desire these qualities.

Schnase reminds us that we are a relational people and "only learn these internal spiritual qualities in the presence of others through the practice of love." What we learn from study is practiced in community. Jesus said, "where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20). "Jesus taught in community so that we would learn to discover his presence in others."

Every member of the church has declared to be a follower of Jesus Christ. Let us all be role models to each other and to the community by intentionally participating in Faith Development/Formation studies, activities, gatherings, and events. By coming together regularly in addition to worship, we are forming ourselves and others to walk in the Way of Jesus.


We have several ladies signed up to attend the Kansas Disciples Women Fall Retreat (DWF) in October and some planning to attend the partial (one day) sessions.

Significant Ethnic Developments

After World War II and the Korean War the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) began to take closer, intentional steps toward biracial advocacy. In American society, the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) began working for justice and in the church, black Disciples found white leaders willing to stand beside them. Black Disciples were encouraged to take leadership roles. Church school literature and other Disciple publications spoke out for racial justice. At conventions, when Disciples refused to meet in segregated facilities, hotels in major cities were opened to all. It was a step in the right direction.

The first Spanish-speaking congregation of Disciples was in 1899 in San Antonio, Texas. The Mexican Christian Institute (Inman Christian Center) was established in 1913. That same year, the Kansas City Mexican Mission (Missouri) was begun in the back room of a grocery store.

Disciples have been a part of Puerto Rican Christianity since the 1930's. Their zealous and evangelical faith was brought to their brothers and sisters in New York City where, sometime before 1940, a small group of Disciples met in an apartment. They grew and purchased a store-front building and named their young church *La Hermosa (The Beautiful)*. In 1943, it related itself to the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) and the mother congregation of other Puerto Rican churches in the city.

Cuban refugees came to America and became Disciples. By the 1970's Spanish speaking congregations were found all over the country. All kinds of congregations were formed to meet the needs of surrounding neighborhoods even with some becoming bilingual. A national office for Spanish and bilingual congregations was later established.
