Reflections

In this last segment of our look at Chapter 3, "The Practice of Passionate Worship" (pp. 55-71) of Robert Schnase's *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* (2018), I'd like to focus on the phrase, "For the love of God," and Schnase's discussion of what that means in relation to Christian worship.

Schnase discusses that time spent in preparation for worship, care taken for details, and the love we put into the preparation are all reflections of our love of God.

In this section of the chapter, Schnase offers suggestions to improve worship and the reason for the improvements are "for the love of God."

When looking at the list of suggestions, I find that we have made several of these improvements on our own! There is more to consider and more to do, all in good time.

Schnase suggests that it is the preparation we do for worship that impacts us most. When <u>everyone</u> comes to worship spiritually prepared, it makes for a more meaningful worship service. This includes the pastor, worship leaders, musicians, AND the congregation as a whole. The old saying, "You get out of it what you put into it" seems to fit.

Your Worship Team meets on a monthly basis, musicians meet with me several times a month, musicians practice their music before every service, deacons have begun meeting once a month, elders meet twice a month, and all leaders are informed of their duties before each service. We are looking to make our services more spiritually alive, more worshipful and meaningful for everyone with attention to the flow of the service. Your voice is important, too. What suggestions do you have?

What could you do to help in preparing for worship "for the love of God"? Would someone like to polish the candlesticks for the communion table? Little things like this would improve worship. A volunteer, rather than a leader, could make a difference for us. "It's all in the details," as they say.

Schnase also invites us to imagine how worship nourishes all other ministries. He suggests "asking each ministry, class, study group, fellowship, choir, band, mission team, member, guest, and volunteer to do something extra 'for the love of God' to strengthen community worship." Imagining could include prayer groups, retreats, updating our technical equipment and website, and funding continuing education for worship and preaching, among others (p. 68).

Each of us are invited to take a good look at what occurs each week in worship and to pay attention to who does what to make it happen. Questions to ask ourselves are, "How does what <u>I do</u> each week affect worship on Sunday morning?" "Am I participating in spiritual preparation before coming to worship?" "What am I doing to help prepare for worship each week for the love of God?"

Perhaps we can work together in creating imaginative ways for us all to participate in preparing for "Passionate Worship" for the love of God. It pleases God for us to be in deep relationship with our Holy Creator and to worship with all our hearts, souls, mind, and strength.



Bible Book Search

There are 30 books of the Bible in this paragraph. Can you find them? This is a most remarkable puzzle. It was found by a gentleman in an airplane seat pocket on a flight from Los Angeles to Honolulu keeping him occupied for hours. He enjoyed it so much he passed it on to some friends. One friend from Illinois worked on this while fishing from his johnboat. Another friend studied it while playing the banjo. Elaine Taylor, a columnist friend, was so intrigued by it she mentioned it in her weekly newspaper column. Another friend judges the job of solving the puzzle so involved that she brews a cup of tea to help her nerves. There will be some names that will be real easy to spot. That's a fact. The Optimistic 1950s

The country was booming. Economic recovery was all but complete. The United States employment was almost full. The building of housing, public structures, and churches was unprecedented as the nation was making up for the lag over the last 20 years. Prosperity was high even though there was the real threat of nuclear war. African-Americans increased their resistance to discrimination and deprivation. Factories became more automated and the space race had begun. The Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) were concerned with all of these developments and met them with American optimism and belief in the future.

National Church staffs were enlarged, increasing services to congregations. Congregational staffs were enlarged and were provided benefits. New and larger church buildings and sanctuaries were erected on new properties making it possible for expanded programs. Downtown city churches considered moving to the suburbs where most of their congregations had moved.

The Korean War (1951-1953) slowed building progress down some. A small percentage of people were involved and some people wondered if the war was necessary. Disciples reserve chaplains were called to active duty briefly.

A two-year national recession (1959-1961) pinched the overexpansion of the 50s. The church felt the effects, yet there was a growing interest in a church structure that was more efficient and effective.
