Reflections

In his discussion about "The Practice of Risk-Taking Mission and Service" in *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations* (2018), Robert Schnase invites us once again, to "Go and Do" (pp. 120-123). While last time many of our existing ministries were lifted up, Schnase invites us to think outside the box. He gives many examples of what mission-minded churches do that help us to creatively think how we can invent and build our own unique ministries within the context of our flavorful community.

Below are some of the ways Schnase suggests that congregations are shaped by Risk-Taking Mission and Service. Missional congregations:

- not only solicit and encourage ordinary service to support the work of the congregation—inviting, equipping, organizing, encouraging—but they also consciously motivate people to more <u>extraordinary</u> service (<u>emphasis mine</u>).
- lift examples in preaching and teaching
- support those on the cutting edge of service with prayer, funding, and appreciation
- develop ways in which everyone can play a supportive role.
- offer mission and service opportunities with gradations of involvement and differing levels of complexity appropriate to the talents, skills, and interests of a variety of people.
- realize the importance of mission formation in children and youth—practicing ageappropriate, hands-on, in-person service. Programs are arranged for missionaries to speak to youth. Funding is available for summer student internships. Collaboration with other local ecumenical youth groups strengthen opportunities for cross-cultural, handson service that help people, reshape attitudes, and form memories.

It's good to consider how these suggestions affect our existing ministries and how they might help us to look beyond what we already do. How can we take what we already do and improve? Do any of these ideas help us to think of something new?

- What areas of mission are you interested in? Have you heard about, done, or seen a ministry somewhere else that you would like to do here? Tell us about it. How would you like to help people?
- How can you turn a hobby into a ministry?
- Have you recently asked someone to help you do a ministry you enjoy? Bring someone along—they might enjoy doing what you do!

Think outside the box! There's a whole world out there to help. What's in store for you? More "Go and Do" to be continued . . .

Who We Are and What Holds Us Together

The authors of this book address our Disciples' identity. They hold that:

Disciples have an identity that is recognizable across the years and across cultures, and a reclaiming of this identity can contribute to much-needed renewal of our denomination, while strengthening our witness as "a movement for wholeness in fragmented world."

Our renewal comes from our appreciation of the past, but we are not held back by outdated thinking and acting. It is the hope of the authors that in our willingness and ability to adapt to changing circumstances, we, with the help of God, will be able to tell others with greater clarity of our Disciples identity—our passion for Christian unity and wholeness.
