## Reflections

During the last 3 years, we have explored "Adaptive Change" according to several different authors and have implemented some technical changes that are part of adaptive change. Much of what happens to us while we are learning to adapt to changes is transformation. Most of the time, we do not notice ourselves learning to adapt, but the Holy Spirit is working to make inner changes in us that lead us to new ideas and eventually to new ways of doing things.

The coronavirus pandemic is an excellent example of adaptive change for everyone. Like it or not, we have to adapt to the changes the pandemic has brought upon us we need to follow the mandates to wash our hands and to shelter in place, for example. Society has had to adapt to these changes so that we can help lower the virus' chances of spreading.

Adaptive change is about doing things differently from now on. Even as people get "cabin fever" and want to quicken the speed of returning to "normal," we will find that "normal" will be very different than before. The church will experience this as well.

We have been learning to adapt to attending church differently. As for me, I have had to go outside of my comfort zone to start broadcasting on Facebook LIVE. People can attend worship on their own terms—in the comfort of their homes, on a different day, or at a different time. In addition, there are those who are learning how to use the Zoom platform. As we learn more about this virtual program, we will find that it is a great way for us to connect as a congregation because we can see each other and participate together. We also send out the worship service in an email and through snail mail to everyone so those without any other way to "attend" worship can do so, even if in written form.

The question for the future is, "How do we continue to use these broadcasting methods as we return to physical church?" How many people attend worship through these virtual methods? Will people who are "shopping" for a church find us and worship with us virtually? How can we use technology for small group Bible studies and meetings? Who could participate in the life of the church who isn't able to right now because of limiting factors? Who can we invite? Right now, two of my friends in two different states are attending worship with us! That's a dream I've had for years that has been impossible up until now. Is there someone you can invite to worship or Bible study that is outside of our normal purview? Is there someone you know that might get a chance to be with us on one of the platforms who normally would not step foot in a church?

Adaptive change. What lies ahead?





### **Spotlight on Disciples**

Information for this article came from the book, *Disciples: Who We Are & What Holds Us Together* (2019) by Michael Kinnamon and Jan Linn, St. Louis: Christian Board of Publication, pp.

### Why We Are Disciples

The authors begin their book with five points that make up our Disciple identity. 1) the importance of the Lord's Supper; 2) we are bound by covenant, not creed; 3) human intelligence is a factor in discerning God's will; 4) emphasis on believer's baptism; 5) recognition of ecumenism and other people of God.

There is hope in our Disciples' sense of unity, wholeness, and healing amid a universal church that historically has been theologically divided, and in a world broken by war and injustice. While appreciating specific gifts that other denominations offer, the authors point out that "Our contention is that Disciples, too, have particular gifts that can help to build up the body of Christ and give powerful demonstration of God's reconciling grace" (p. 3).

As Disciples gather with a commitment to a mission of unity, Alexander Campbell's (one of our founders) statement "We are not the only Christians, but Christians only," has been a paradox that runs deep through our Disciples' history. Yet, we have a distinctive identity that pulls us all together that the authors will explore more in depth.
