Reflections

Every year we celebrate the season of Advent. During the four weeks leading up to Christmas Day, Christmas decorations are placed in the sanctuary and the month is filled with traditional activities such as a Christmas Pageant. In recent years, a family time of making decorations and cookies has been added to prepare for Christmas. The congregation typically comes together for a traditional Christmas dinner following worship. It's a wonderful, joyous time in the church of getting ready for Christ's coming. So, what exactly is Advent? Why do we light candles on the Advent wreath?

The season of Advent is a time of waiting. The name comes from the Latin word *adventus*, meaning coming or arrival. While the meaning holds that we wait expectantly for the coming of God as a human child, it also means the second coming of Christ in the last days. This is why the scriptures in Advent include lessons on Christ's second coming—"be alert and watchful," we are told. Of course, the focus is on the birth of Jesus, wrapped in cloth and laid to rest in a manger of straw. We celebrate this event on Christmas Day.

Advent fills us with joy at the expectation of the birth of baby Jesus. The church celebrates through worship, singing, and simple readings along with the lighting of the Advent candles.

The origins of the celebration of Advent are relatively unknown, but the period of preparation can be traced as far back as 480 A.D. The practice of lighting the Advent wreath likely originated in Germany or France within the Lutheran church around the 16th century. Traditionally, the Advent Wreath is in the form of a circle as a crown to represent God's unending love and symbolizing victory. It is traditionally decorated with fir branches with red ribbon, pinecones, holly, laurel, and sometimes mistletoe to symbolize the hope of eternal life that God's people share. The holly recalls the crown of thorns resting on the head of Christ.

Four candles are set in the wreath with the Christ candle in the center to represent the four weeks until Christmas Day, as well as the thousands of years people have awaited the coming of the Messiah. The flames of the candles represent the Light of the World coming to bring hope and peace and are a symbol of the struggle against darkness. The lighting of an additional candle each week in Advent marks the anticipation of the coming of the Light of the World.

Purple has been used for Advent since the 13th century. Some churches today prefer to use blue (traced to the Church of Sweden) as a sign of hope for Advent rather than the purple which has the Lenten associations of solemnity and somberness.

Purple (or blue) candles are traditionally used to mark the first, second and fourth Sundays in Advent and represent Hope, Peace and Love. A pink candle is used on the third Sunday to represent Joy. The white Christ candle is used on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to represent the birth of the Messiah.

While 2020 hosts a most unusual Advent, families can make their own Advent wreaths at home to celebrate the coming of the Christ child. During our broadcast as the candles are lit in the sanctuary each Sunday, families can light their candles at home. This practice will symbolize unity and togetherness. If you do not have the materials to make a wreath, it's okay to improvise. I once made an Advent wreath with a styrofoam base and all red candles. Be creative and celebrate any way you can! Maybe you only have one candle (or flashlight)—you can still read the Advent scriptures and light your candle to anticipate the coming of the Christ child!

Continue to celebrate Advent with joyous expectation of the coming of the Christ child. Christ is the Promise of Hope we all need right now. Let us prepare our hearts for the One who comes to save us all.

Spotlight on Disciples

Information for this article came from the book, *Disciples: Who We Are & What Holds Us Together* (2019) by Michael Kinnamon and Jan Linn, St. Louis: Christian Board of Publication, pp. 43-44.

As Kinnamon and Linn explore Disciples' interpretation of celebrating the Lord's Supper, they discuss Paul's recount of the supper as remembrance. "This do in remembrance of me," Paul writes (1 Corinthians 11:23-26). The Greek term "anamnesis" means to remember, but as the authors say, "it carries special force." It is more than remembering, it is "a re-presentation which makes what is past a vivid and lively reality here and now." This means that as we gather at the Table, Christ is not only remembered, but is also present with us.

Nils Dahl says, "The Lord's supper was central to the church's act of remembering, not as an individual experience as Disciples tend to make it, but as a moment in worship when the church as the body of Christ enters into collective experience in recalling the history of salvation. The Lord's Supper was in effect this history 're-presented by the sacramental commemoration.'"

Paul, influenced by his Jewish background, wrote of anamnesis—this way of remembering—to help us understand how we participate in the Lord's Supper both personally and collectively taking Communion. We carry with us a communal sense of not only remembering the story, but also re-experiencing the past suffering and rescue. The power of anamnesis opens us to experiencing the Holy Spirit.
