Reflection

Dear Friends,

Last Sunday in the sermon, I called you and the whole congregation to a time of discerning prayer as we prepare to gather on January 22 for an exercise designed to help the congregation explore its future and articulate our response to the key questions:

- 1. Who does God call this congregation to be?
- 2. What does God call this congregation to do?

Individually and communally we are always facing decisions. Sometimes they are quite easy – what should I wear today or what should we eat tonight; but other times they are tormenting – for what vocation should I prepare, should I change jobs, who should we call as a leader, how do we balance the budget? These two questions which we will focus upon come January 22 are tough questions.

Frank Rogers defines discernment as the intentional practice by which a community or an individual seeks, recognizes, and intentionally takes part in the activity of God in concrete situations. Rogers outlines one way to engage in such discernment which involves several steps.

- 1. Become aware of as many dimensions of the decision before us as possible. We consider the consequences, gather information, gain insight from others, and even consult experts if need be.
- 2. Devote a particular amount of time from a few days to several weeks to considering the negative side or the decision we feel least inclined to choose. We reflect on what life would be like if this were our choice. We would continue to pray and listen for God's movement. We would allow all of our emotions, thoughts, and stirrings to surface and then reflect upon them. Are we attracted towards this decision or repelled by it.
- 3. Discern if the source of these emotions, thoughts, and stirrings were divine or from another source such as our own wants and desires. This step calls for painful honesty and self-awareness. Here we ask ourselves if the source of these emotions, thoughts, and stirrings is life giving or destructive.
- 4. Repeat the second and third step with the decision we feel most inclined to choose. We ask ourselves what life would be like if this were our choice. What is the source of the emotions, thoughts, and stirrings? Is it life giving or destructive?
- 5. After some time, we would make a tentative decision and spend some more time living with, praying and reflecting on it so we might receive confirmation from God that this is the right decision.
- 6. Act in the direction that seems most in tune with the movements of the Spirit.

This process does not always lead to absolute certainty but it brings us into step with the activity of God (Rogers, Practices 107-110).

I've included the handout from Sunday's bulletin as well. This handout includes two prayers to use in your discernment as well as some additional guidelines. I hope you will diligently engage in this period of discernment.



Participant Requirements for Communal Discernment Toward Consensus:

- Trust that the resolution has the potential to be based on something larger than self -interest and partisanship.
- Seek personal wisdom about God's direction for the community, laying aside control and esteem needs for the sake of finding God's leading through the whole community.
- Create a safe space to speak and process that includes the voices of everyone present, which may sometimes necessitate small group sharing.
- Remain open to the wisdom of other participants, even when it may not sound like wisdom upon first hearing.

Questions and Activities for Authentic Discernment

- Recall a decision that in retrospect was a
 wise one. How did you make it? What factors
 did you weigh? With whom did you consult?
 What would have been the consequences if
 you had made a different decision?
- Recall a decision you made that you now regret. What was the process by which you make that decision? Have you since discovered clues about how you could have made that decision differently?
- Make a short list of people you might call when you are faced with a tough decision. What do you look for from these people? How do they help you?
- As a group, role-play the process of communal discernment as if you were a decision-making body of your community. You could choose a real decision that faces your community to come up with a hypothetical scenario.
- Encounter scripture using a contemplative approach, such as lectio divina.
